Zack was located in northern Brazos County, on Ferrill Branch in the Colbert Baker grant, two miles southeast of Cottonwood. Zachariah Guest operated a store there, which he later sold to Cyrus Koontz. (<u>Brazos County History – Rich Past, Bright Future</u>, page 42). Postmasters at Zack included Zach R. Guess (appointed 29 March 1904), Cyrus Koontz (appointed 23 October 1906), and C.E. Locke (appointed 8 August 1910).

Notice of Election. Whereas, on the 14th day of September, 1914, a petition signed by the requisite number of signers was presented to the Commissioners Court asking that the election be called in the following described territory, to wit: "Beginning at the intersection of the Dillishaw Tap and Kurten and Wheelock roads; thence with and along the center of the Dillishaw Tap road to where the S.E. line of the A.J. Lewis survey crosses said road; thence N. 47 E. with the said Lewis line to the north corner of the

Lewis survey; then along the northeast line of the Taylor and Geo. Edge tracts to the north corner of the Geo. Edge tract; thence S. 45 E. along the line between the Geo. Edge and Ed Payne tracts to Cedar Creek; thence up Cedar Creek to the mouth of Bee Creek; thence up Bee Creek to the Kurten and Wheelock road; thence with said road in a southeasterly direction in the center of said road to the place of beginning." To determine whether or not horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be allowed to run at large. And the Court having considered the same, ordered an election to be held at Zack, Texas, on the 24th day of October, 1914 Bryan Weekly Eagle, 24 September 1914, page 8.
